

AWAY \dashv

I used to use \triangleleft for a distance indicator
(\triangleleft near \triangleleft far) but never liked the triangle.
I suppose I didn't want to use $_$ because I use
a shorter line for a place indicator ($_$ here $_$ there
 $_$ where) $_$ for the surface of the earth in day $_$
night $_$, as a linen indicator $_$ sleep $_$ awake, etc.

But once I decided to go ahead & use $_$ as a
distance indicator, I was relieved & happy: $_$ near
 $_$: far $_$ neighbor $_$ remote (to move, not) etc.

I used to use \rightarrow (or \leftrightarrow for "away" but never
liked it (\rightarrow a to \rightarrow way \leftarrow from))

The other day I thought of \dashv

I often use \dashv (this) in location words: \dashv beyond
 \dashv here \dashv place \dashv out (of) \dashv outside

(\dashv could be "far" but I like the simplicity of
 $_$ for "far") The short vertical line gives a sense
of separation (\cdot : separate (\leftrightarrow apart .par arrange)

So, "to \dashv ", \dashv \dashv ! "Go away, get out of here!"

"Away" also has the meaning "where it belongs"
and "not facing" but I won't bother to try expressing
these with ide.
